Francis Bertram, SJ., had a long term vision and he placed a strong foundation for a bright future of the College. The glory of Loyola College is manifested in the ways it has formed its students.

The college is located in the heart of Chennai city. The vast campus of 87 acres, provides good play grounds, adequate buildings, and infrastructure.

But as the strength has tripled in 10 years and as most of the students are from rural areas, we need to provide more class rooms, hostel facilities and other services. Today the college has more than 2500 Students in economics and commerce related subjects. The facilities are inadequate and we also have to provide many smart class rooms to make use of technology.

Today's education, if it strives to be innovative and qualitative, must use technology, especially ICT facilities. Loyola must improve its facilities in ICT. The *Loyola Master Plan* has been designed. Loyola Master Plan (LMP) is first and foremost an exercise that widens Loyola's horizons and goes beyond settled foundations to formulate a Vision for Loyola 2025.

- i) To provide an exceptional education for both undergraduates and postgraduates that makes them unique in terms of character formation that would lead to making significant contributions to society, regionally, nationally and internationally through fruits of research and skills of graduates, its entrepreneurial activities, and policy leadership.
- ii) To envision the type of education in 2025 – the ways we teach and the ways the students learn – and put in place effective structures and efficient mechanisms to meet the challenges of future education.
- iii) To develop new schools, departments and institutes of excellence within Loyola college and extension centers in the state and beyond to enhance the profile of the college.
- iv) To attract, develop and retain academic staff of the highest international calibre and make Loyola College and its departments, centres and institutes employers of choice for all staff in the international, national and local environments.
- v) To recruit through equitable process the best students from all sections with special emphasis on rural and marginalized sections and the first generation learners based on their socio-cultural background, achievement and potential.
- vi) To deliver excellent facilities and services and manage them effectively and responsively for the benefit of staff and students.

Fr. Jerome D.Souza, S.J. (*1942 - 50*)



Fr. Jerome served as the principal of Loyola College in Chennai (1942 - 50) had mediated between the Vatican and Nehru about ending Portuguese control of Indian churches, was a member of the Indian Constituent Assembly and four times India's delegate to the UN General Assembly.

Fr. L.D. Murphy, S.J (*1938 - 42*)



Father Murphy, an Englishman from Oxford. A classical scholar. A great speaker. Admirable teacher. He was a Principal who combined firmness with raciousness.

Fr. Kuriakose, S.J. (*Principal 1970 - 83*)



Loyola's longest served principal, Fr. Kuriakose was a man born to deal with crisis: Watching, waiting, eloquently silent but ruthlessly firm when occasion demanded and was responsible for starting the experiment of autonomy granted to the college.

Scholarships

PhD Studentships

We want to support poor students who want to pursue research leading to award of PhD degree. It could be any discipline of the college. In this we want to raise 10 Cr rupees of corpus.

Research

In this Campaign, we want to raise 75 Cr rupees initially to support research in all disciplines. In science and arts, and in commerce, we would like to evolve a cohesive plan to encourage research. This research will be done in close collaboration with industry and social sectors. The fund will be used to build laboratories, buy e-resources, develop research facilities and infrastructures.

Apart from this main fund, we want also to institute Fellowships. For this, each fellowship would cost 5 Lakh rupees. We plan to institute fifty fellowships in all disciplines.

The aim of Loyola College is to provide University education in a Christian atmosphere to deserving students, especially those belonging to the Catholic Christian Community. Although this college is meant primarily for Catholics, it does admit other students irrespective of their caste and creed. It focuses more on the poorer and marginalized sections of the society and Dalits. More than 50% of our students belong to the poor category. There is a sizable number of first generation learners. We like to extend helping hand to educate them and mould them to be a useful citizen to our nation.

We are in the process of creating a Poor Students' Fund to the tune of 10 crores to help the needy students with scholarships and free noon meals.

Donors are welcome to sponsor education of the underprivileged students.

- An individual student can be sponsored for his/her college fees and hostel fees.
- An amount may be given to the poor students. The interest from this fund will be given as scholarships to the needy students.
- In any other form the donor may wish.

The School of Commerce & Economics

Estimated Cost ₹ 32 Crores

To love the poor and to serve the poor for sustainable growth

Loyola's new initiative is to create a comprehensive and modern programme in Business and Economics studies and research that will groom the Business leaders of tomorrow. The proposed School of Business studies will significantly enhance Loyola's existing Commerce and Economics departments, as well as introduce a world class undergraduate programme in Business Administration. Over the years we have realized that applicants to commerce and commerce related courses have greatly increased. But the infrastructure we have and the facilities we use fall below the standard of a world class institution. We plan to build a school with state-of-the-art facilities that would accommodate students of commerce, and economics.

The School of Business will house more than 2200 students, which is 30% of the entire college strength at present but more than the entire college strength of yesteryears. It will offer all the business related courses like B.B.A., B.Com., B.Com. (Corporate), B.A.



(Economics), M.Com. M.A. (Economics), M.Phil. and Ph.D. Though the college has preferential option for the poor and the marginalized, it admits students from all over India and abroad with all hues of faith and economic status.

But the fast changing socio economic realities call for world-class facilities, pedagogy and personnel, to serve the nation and prepare the students to become world leaders of tomorrow.



Loyola Hostel for Boys

Estimated Cost ₹ 85 Crores

A great place to learn, an ethos to make new friends and orientation to live life to the full



Loyola plans to build a separate hostel for boys and girls. The capacity being 2000 with all the facilities like room coolers, geysers, other facilities like TV, VCR and phone will also be provided in the Hostel Lounge.

To meet the need we have to build men's hostel for 2500 students. Secondly, the new hostel should cater to the needs of poor, rural students, middle class students from other parts of India and international students.

This facility is ideal for conferences or ceremonies that need to accommodate large groups in a graceful, dignified setting. Auditorium will be fully air-conditioned and handicapped accessible.
